The Pit Stop

The Corvette Makes Its First Public Appearance Sixty-Nine Years Ago at the GM Motorama in New York City

It was 69 years ago today that thousands of Americans gathered at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City to catch a glimpse of Chevrolet's new two-seater sports car. The EX-122 concept was such an instant hit with the public that GM rushed into production the revolutionary fiberglass-bodied car. Six months later, the first Corvette was completed at a makeshift assembly plant in Flint, Michigan. Just 300 Corvettes were produced in 1953 with a sticker price of about \$3,500.

The genesis of the first American sports car came in 1951 following Harley Earl's trip to Watkins Glen. Impressed with the small European Sports cars, he begins thinking about a 2-seater American sports car. Code named "Project Opel" the Corvette was known to only a few at the time. In 1952, Harley Earl showed his initial designs to Chevrolet engineering chief Ed Cole who was reportedly very enthusiastic about the project. Together, the two pitched the Corvette to the GM suits and were given the go-ahead to develop a prototype for the 1953 Motorama.



In late December 1952, the prototype was completed. It was officially known as the Corvette after being named by Chevy photographer Myron Scott. Chevy wanted the car to start with a "C" and supposedly rejected 1500 suggestions.

The Motorama Corvette was shown to GM executives in early January 1953. The only changes suggested was removing the American flag from the original logo. A new logo was designed in a hurry and featured two crossed flags – one being the Chevy bow-tie and the other being a fleur-de-lis which paid homage to the French background of Chevrolet namesake Louis Chevrolet.



You can't see him in this crowd picture but one of the attendees of the GM Motorama show was a Belgium immigrant named Zora Arkus-Duntov. Zora was so taken with the Corvette and its potential that he wrote a letter to Chevrolet Chief Engineer Ed Cole. Ed Cole was so impressed with Zora that he offered him an assistant staff engineering position and the rest is history!

Miller Family Sells Le Mans Winning 1960 Cunningham Corvette

One of the most famous Corvette race cars in history has just been sold! The Miller Family and Corvette collector Irwin Kroiz recently came to an agreement for an undisclosed sum and now the No.3 1960 Cunningham Corvette will join the family of many famous Corvettes in the Irwin Kroiz Collection.

It's not often that we see special Corvettes like the 1960 Cunningham Corvette change hands, and we reached out to both Lance and Irwin about the sale of the former racecar.

"During Amelia Island this past year, my dear friend Irwin Kroiz and I were discussing cars. In particular, if I had any interest in selling the Cunningham Corvette which happened to be on display along with the C8 Cunningham tribute car all weekend," Lance said in an email to *CorvetteBlogger*.

"It is something that I have thought about from time to time, but it just never quite seemed like the 'right' time," he added.

"However, after discussing with my mom and family, it became clear that it was the right time, and the decision was made even easier knowing that the car was going to someone who would cherish the car just as much as my dad and myself did."

Irwin, who has been thinking for a long time about purchasing this Holy Grail of Corvettes, tells us via email that he is so thankful that Lance Miller has given him the opportunity to be the Corvette's next caretaker. The car will be moved to its new home to be part of Irwin's collection where it will live on for future generations.

The Irwin Kroiz collection includes a number of noteworthy Corvettes and he often shares select examples at Bloomington Gold and the Muscle Car and Corvette Nationals shows. Highlights of Irwin's collection include the 1956 Corvette SR-2, 1962 Bardahl Racer, 1966 427/425 Tanker, a 1967 Corvette Factory L88 Coupe (last one built!), the 1968 Corvette Factory L88 Sunray DX #3 racer (Sebring Class Winner), and a 1969 Corvette Factory L88 One-Owner Black on Black Coupe.

The No.3 Cunningham Corvette at Le Mans

The tale of the Le Mans Corvettes begins in Cincinnati, Ohio with Briggs Cunningham, a young man born into a family of wealth and privilege. After winning the most prestigious yachting race America's Cup, he set his sights on winning the 24 Hours of Le Mans in an American car with American drivers.



Following several efforts in the fifties with his own race cars, in 1960 Cunningham brought a team of Cunningham Corvettes to be entered in the 24 Hours of Le Mans race. All three cars had the same high-performance options installed with the help of Zora Arkus-Duntov

and back door assistance from Chevrolet. The three Corvettes were numbered 1, 2, and 3 with the #3 Corvette driven by John Fitch and Bob Grossman. The day of the race it was raining and Fitch and Grossman became famous for driving through hours of slippery rain while at the same time passing each car in front of them.



It was during that first Le Mans race that those racing the Corvettes showed their "Never Give Up" attitude when one of the mechanics mistakenly took off the radiator cap and most of motor coolant sprayed out of the radiator and was lost. Because of the track rules, nobody was allowed to put fluid in the radiator if the car had been running less than 25 laps. So, the mechanics took a cooler with ice and stacked the ice on the intake manifold and engine block to keep the engine cool while racing around the track.



In spite of the problems, Bob Grossman crossed the finishing line and placed 1st in class and 8th overall. This was a great accomplishment for Corvette's history.

The Quest for the No.3 Cunningham Corvette

After the No.3 Corvette won its class at Le Mans, the three Cunningham race cars were returned to the United States where they were converted back to street use and sold as used cars to unsuspecting owners. The hunt and restoration of the No.3 Corvette was featured in *The Quest* documentary that tells the tale of Corvettes at Carlisle co-founder Chip Miller in his search for the missing Le Mans Corvette.

That search was jumpstarted after "Corvette Hunter" Kevin Mackay turned up the three VINs of the 1960 Corvettes while searching the Le Mans racing archives. With the VIN in hand, the car was located and eventually purchased for Chip.

Chip's dream was to restore the No.3 Corvette and return to Le Mans in 2010 with original driver John Fitch to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of their historic win. That dream was unfortunately cut short in 2004 when Chip passed away from an extremely rare disease called amyloidosis. His son Lance picked up his father's quest and in 2010 returned the No.3 Cunningham racer and its driver to Le Mans to celebrate 50 years of Corvette Racing at the French Classic.

Time for a New Home

Corvettes like the No.3 Corvette are rare, not just for being the first Corvette to win at Le Mans, but rare in the sense that it's a Corvette with an amazing history that has touched so many different people in a profound way. Cars like these become personalities in their own right, and even members of the family as long-term owners often describe these special vehicles.

As the 1960 Cunningham Corvette begins its new chapter of ownership, we know the car and its history will be in great hands with Irwin, and we hope he continues the tradition of

showing the car in public so that others can also touch the history of the first Corvette to win Le Mans.

Lance sums it all in these final thoughts:

"I have so many amazing memories with this car that I will forever be grateful. I also know that Irwin will also have many wonderful memories with this car wherever his travels will take him. I've been fortunate to carry on the journey that my dad started with this historical Corvette and I know the journey will not end with Irwin. It is in amazing hands! As my father would frequently say – "Life is good."

Tech Tip Be cool this summer with you C5

Would you like to better understand how you can keep your C5 running cool during the 2022 driving season and there after? Well, maybe the information I am about to give may be of interest to you. This also applies to C4 owners in that both cars are what are known as "ground feeders" meaning the air to cool the radiator/AC condenser comes off the ground/pavement up into the units to cool them. This of course picks up debris on the ground and may clog your radiator or AC condenser.

I own a 2004 C5 coupe. This car has the LS1 engine and is the last year of C5 production, so it has the best technology available at the time. Also, many of the bugs that caused problems for the C5 generation have been worked out. However, basic maintenance is always in order and may save you a headache or two on your next cruise.

As you well know your engine's radiator is a major portion of your cooling system. In front of your engine radiator is your AC condenser which looks like a radiator. If you are able to look under the front of your C5 and look up you will probably see the AC condenser and

debris such as leaves small twigs and seed pods. Refer to the Pic 1.

Unfortunately, I have already cleaned the debris from my AC condenser but if you have never cleaned this area you should have some leaves, etc. to clean off. You can use compressed air to clean the area of course being careful not to nick any part of your condenser. You could also use a hose and nozzle to rinse out the area. This is the easy part. You're not done yet.

To get to the area between the engine radiator and the AC condenser you will need to

remove the air intake duct (Pic 2)

from the intake manifold/plenum.

You then need to remove the long black shroud under the air intake duct (Pic3)

revealing the area between the engine radiator and the AC condenser (Pic4).

As you can see mine has debris which seems mainly to be pine needles and some small leaves.

Now for those of you who are hesitant to remove parts of your engine I will refer you to a video that will make it look pretty easy;

1983 Corvette Analog Gauge Cluster

As we begin the year leading up to the 70th anniversary of Corvette's debut at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City, the National Corvette Museum is launching our Artifact of the Month program! Each month, our Curatorial staff will select an artifact from our collection that is connected to a significant moment in Corvette history and share its story with you. To kick off this program our Director of Collections & Curator, Derek E. Moore, presents the...

1983 Corvette Analog Gauge Cluster

Some of the greatest mysteries in Corvette's rich production history revolve around the choice to skip production on Corvette's 30th anniversary in 1983. The transition from the third-generation (C3) to the fourth-generation (C4) Corvette was a major technological leap forward for Chevrolet and was the beginning of transitioning Corvette from being a brute American sports car to a global competitor of the European sports car market. During this major transition, every component of Corvette was being reimagined, redesigned, and reengineered – from the exterior to the interior.

An all-new look to the interior was key to this transition, and the instrument panel display was vital. The plan to bring Corvette into the "digital age" led to the development of a graphical cluster utilizing all digital read-outs and bar graphs to provide the driver with vehicle statistics quickly and cleanly.

During the earliest stages of development though, engineers discovered that generating enough light to see the readouts on the cluster was difficult and there were concerns over the dash's performance in cold climates. Therefore, an analog "backup" cluster was created, with its very standard, multiple gauge – speedometer, tachometer, oil pressure, fuel, oil temperature, voltage, and coolant temperature – layout. While functional, it was a very dated appearing cluster for this all-new Corvette. During testing at Milford Proving Grounds, both the analog and new digital dash were running in 1983 development Corvettes.

Corvette Chief Engineer, Dave McLellan, recently reflected on the development of the analog cluster for the C4 Corvette:

"I was never happy with this cluster. It was always considered as a backup to the color graphic cluster. Why was I unhappy? It was uninteresting and it suffered from reflection problems. We had no intentions of using it if we could solve the problems of the graphical cluster.

The C4 was bringing the Corvette into the digital age. The instrument cluster was proposed by our Interior Design Studio led by Bill Scott. GM's AC Division planned to engineer and produce it. Its "Achilles Heel" was getting enough light through the light pipes while at the same time not overheating the display. Only recently have we seen LED bulbs made

available for this application which have given the display the brightness and color expected.

Why this design? The genesis of the design was the steering wheel graphics seen in F1. And, if you think about how to best display information – information like RPMs, that can change rapidly, are best displayed as a bar graph. If they were displayed as numbers, they would look like an incomprehensible blizzard of numbers."

National Corvette Museum Scholarship

Scholarship Guidelines

Scholarship applications for the 2022-23 school year will be available January 1, 2022. Deadline to apply 02/28/2022.

The National Corvette Restorers Society has provided funding for the National Corvette Museum to offer a scholarship annually in the amount of \$2,500.

All scholarships shall be awarded in a non-discriminate manner, without regard to color, creed, national origin or gender. Any scholarship awarded is for one year. Recipients shall not be eligible for renewal or reapplication of future scholarships from the Museum. The application process shall consist of completing the NCM application form. A notice of availability of the scholarship program shall be provided on the Museum's website, social media, email list and America's Sports Car magazine, a publication furnished by NCM to its members. Distribution of scholarship funds will be made directly to each student following confirmation of enrollment. In the event of any misuse of scholarship funds, the Museum shall permanently terminate the right to the misusing individual to further participate in the scholarship program and initiate and diligently prosecute collection activities to recover

from the recipient all amounts which have been misused. No scholarship may be awarded to any person who is related by descent or marriage to anyone who serves on the Museum's Board of Directors or is an employee of the Museum.

Selection and Eligibility Guidelines

- 1. Applicants must be NCM members or children or grandchildren of NCM members. (membership must be current at time of application and award)
- 2. Applicants must have applied and been accepted at an accredited post-secondary school, technical school, college or university.
- 3. Applicants must be pursuing a degree related to the automotive, museum or non-profit industry, or a field which would work in those industries (i.e. human resources, finance, marketing, information technology, etc.).
- 4. Applicants must be planning to enroll in 12 or more hours per semester.
- 5. While academic and extracurricular performance will be considered, work or volunteer experience in automotive, museum or non-profit related fields and apparent financial need will also be considered in the application. Applicants must include a statement of the source of their funds for their education (i.e. loans, other scholarships, grants, etc.)

Process

Applications are made available online here beginning in Jan/Feb each year to students desiring to apply. General communications are made through the National Corvette Museum's member magazine, social media, website and email lists so that all members are aware of the program guidelines and timeline. Applications will be available for download on the Museum's website. Applications received before or after the posted dates will not be considered. Similarly, applications which are incomplete or contain erroneous information will not be considered.

Scholarships are awarded on a one academic year basis. Payments will be made to the student in September after evidence is provided to the scholarship committee of their successful enrollment in school.




